


Key messages

- 1. The benefits of improved workforce literacy and numeracy are compelling.
- 2. The key forces affecting our economic growth compound the imperative to improve workforce literacy.
- 3. A high proportion of New Zealand's workforce has low literacy.
- 4. The supply side for literacy provision is developing. There are considerable opportunities to accelerate workforce literacy and numeracy skill development.
- 5. Developing New Zealand's workforce is a shared responsibility a partnership between government, business, industry, unions and education and training providers is essential.


Budget 2008 – literacy and numeracy

Budget 2008 provided \$168 million over a four year period to raise workforce literacy and numeracy levels by progressively:

- increasing awareness of employers and employees about the importance of literacy and numeracy
- increasing the number of learning opportunities that include literacy and numeracy
- ensuring that these learning opportunities are high quality
- using a programme of research, monitoring and evaluation to build the evidence base








- Building scale and sustainability


